

Call for nominations: ESERA Doctoral Student Executive Board member

ESERA is calling for nominations for a doctoral student Executive Board member. Further details about membership are specified in the ESERA Constitution which is available on the website (https://www.esera.org/about/constitution-of-esera).

Candidates for the ESERA Student Executive Board position are asked to provide up to 250 words in support of their candidature alongside a photograph.

All nominations must be supported by a proposer and a seconder who are both members of ESERA and who have their main professional affiliation in European countries. The proposer, the seconder and the candidate cannot have their main professional affiliation in the same country. Nominations should be addressed to the ESERA president, Lucy Avraamidou (e-mail: president@esera.org). Deadline for nominations: November 30th, 2023. After that date, the nominations will be displayed on the ESERA website, and ESERA members will be invited to cast their vote through a secure electronic voting system. The deadline for voting is December 30, 2023 and the duties start date is January 8, 2024.

In addition to what applies to all Executive Boards positions, the following apply:

- The student member of the Board has the right to one vote in any decision related to the Executive Board business:
- At the time of the nomination, the nominee is a full-time PhD student enrolled in a university in Europe;

• The duration of the appointment is 2 years starting in January (even years) and the student member does not necessarily have to be a PhD student throughout the duration of the appointment.

ESERA Early Career Researcher Travel Awards 2024

Submission deadline: Jan 12, 2024 (5pm Central European Time)

ESERA is offering travel awards of up to 1.000 euros for early career researchers to visit other countries to meet science education researchers with expertise relevant to applicants' project. The awards can be granted to ESERA members who are currently enrolled in doctoral studies, or who were awarded their doctorate no more than 3 years before the submission deadline. Applicants with career breaks are also welcome to apply even if they were awarded their doctorate more than 3 years before the submission deadline.

For 2024, ten awards will be funded. Awardees can either be:

- 1. affiliated with an institution in Europe* and use the award to visit any institution worldwide, or
- 2. affiliated with an institution outside of Europe and use the award to visit an institution in Europe.

Applicants should plan the visit in collaboration with their host researcher. The awards are for researchers to share expertise, address an issue of concern in the applicant's work, or to otherwise advance the applicant's research. Awards can be used to pay for travel, accommodation and/or subsistence. Awards are not intended to support attendance at conferences or summer schools, nor visits that are part of an established collaboration. Reports from previous awards can be viewed on the ESERA website.

Applicants are expected to discuss their applications with their supervisor before submission. Applications will be assessed by a three-person panel, including at least one ESERA Executive Board member, based on the following criteria:

- potential value of the visit for the professional development of the awardee, and
- feasibility of the anticipated outcomes of the visit.

The assessment process will ensure a spread of geographic representation and priority will be given to applicants who have not previously received an ESERA travel award. Awardees will be expected to ensure that they are adequately insured and must write a report of 2-3 pages for publication on the ESERA website following their visit. The awardees are also asked to acknowledge this support from ESERA in related publications or conference presentations.

Timeline:

- Submission of applications by Jan 12th 2024 (5pm CET)
- Awardees notified by the end of Jan 2024
- Awardees should carry out the planned visits during Feb 1st 2024 Jan 31th 2025

ESERA Summer School 2025: Call for proposals

ESERA invites proposals from science education research groups to host the ESERA 2025 Summer School. Proposals should be submitted by January 31st 2024 through email in a word format to Digna Couso.

Proposals should include the following:

- the names of the local organizing committee members
- the applicants' names, institutions and a 2-page CV for each
- the proposed location of the conference, with a description of how the venue aligns with the summer school needs (see below).
- details of previous involvement of the organizers in ESERA events and a rationale (500-1000 words) indicating why their proposal should be chosen

Things to know

- Plans for the summer school must still include three possible formats:
 - full participant in-person attendance (traditional arrangements)
 - o full virtual participation
 - a hybrid summer school where there is a mixture of in-person and virtual attendees.
- Since a full virtual or hybrid summer school will require additional planning beyond traditional arrangements, the organizing group needs to have the personnel resources and additional time as a part of their proposal.
- The Board is interested in locations accessible (both geographically and financially) to a large number of PhD students.
- Countries where the Summer School has not previously been held are strongly encouraged to apply.

- The main organiser expected to attend the summer school prior to the summer for which they are bidding. This person will participate in the summer school as a staff member and be financially supported by the Board.
- The Summer School is paid for through student contributions (500 euros or less each) as well as an ESERA Board contribution (near 15,000 euros). These funds suffice for food and accommodation for all students and staff, and venue costs if not donated by the sponsoring university and a social function during the summer school week. Depending on the country and location of the summer school, additional funds donated from a local agency may be needed. The total maximum that students should have to pay is 500 euros. Forty-nine students will be selected to attend. A venue at or near university facilities is preferred since it helps with planning and organization and saves costs.
- The Summer School needs a lecture hall for 80 persons (for a daily plenary, but this is not required for the full duration of each day); seven group rooms with projection (nine persons in each room) and three or four workshop rooms (25 persons in each room).
- Meeting rooms and participant residences close to each other are highly desirable.
- At least 2/3rds of the residence rooms should be single rooms with some doubles for students who prefer to share. Staff should be accommodated in single residence rooms in the same or a nearby facility.
- Digital capabilities among the organizing group need to be able to handle, if needed, a
 hybrid or virtual summer school. Some elements of even a fully site-based summer
 school will also require digital skills, such as digital presentation and review of posters.
 The local organizing group will want to post a unique web-site for their summer school,
 either locally or/and on the ESERA site, using their own university expertise.
- The number of student and staff applicants varies from year to year. Recent ranges have been from 60 to 100 PhD students and from 25 to 40 staff.
- The organising committee is responsible for the evaluation of the student applications through reviews carried out by ESERA members the organising committee and the ESERA Board are responsible for the evaluation of the staff applications.

- Deadline for proposals: January 31, 2024
- Deadline for results by the ESERA Board: mid-March 2024
